Annual FAA Runway Safety Action Team

The annual FAA Runway Safety Action Team (RSAT) meetings for the bi-state area were conducted this past May and June. The purpose of these meetings is to identify and mitigate risks of surface events. Here are some of the highlights of those meetings:

The Movement Area of an airfield is anywhere ATC permission is required for operation. In general, this means taxiways and runways.

Each runway is bordered by a Runway typically Safety Area (RSA) including from the extending 250 feet runway centerline, 500 to 1000 feet from the ends of the runway. It is important this area be free of equipment and vehicles during takeoff and landing operations and each airport has established policies and procedures to do so. Procedures include radio constant personnel communications with airport operating in the RSA while conducting operations such as snow plowing, mowing or runway lighting repairs.

The RSA is designed to protect airport users in the event of a Runway Excursion (RE). A Runway Excursion is a veer off or overrun from the runway surface (ICAO) and generally occurs during takeoff or landing. Let's review some definitions.

SI: A surface Incident is "An unauthorized or unapproved movement within the designated movement area (excluding runway incursions) or an occurrence in that same area associated with the operation of an aircraft that affects or could affect the safety of flight (ICAO)."

Types of Surface Events:

Operational Incident (OI) – A surface event attributed to ATCT action or inaction.

Pilot Deviation (PD) – A surface event caused by a pilot or other person operating an aircraft under its own power.

Annual FAA Runway Safety Action Team (Continued)

Vehicle or pedestrian Deviation (VPD) – A surface event caused by a vehicle driver or pedestrian

Other – Surface events which cannot clearly be attributed to a mistake or incorrect action by a controller, pilot, driver or pedestrian.

In FY2019 there were 1637 runway incursions and 415 surface incidents in the National Airspace System. In addition, there were 340 runway excursions.

In the same period there were 1146 wrong surface landing events. Of these:

- 17.8% involved commercial aircraft
- 81.1% involved GA aircraft
- 95% occurred with vis 3 sm or greater
- 85.3% occurred at Level 9 ATCT or lower facilities
- 87.0% occurred during daylight

Also, from 2016 there have been 743 wrong surface departure events.

So where are the risks?

- Parallel runways operations, especially with offset thresholds (like 12R and 11 at STL)
- Parallel taxiways (look like runways)
- Nearby airports with similar runway configurations

Here are a few items to consider during training and Flight reviews:

- Runway markings
- Airport signage
- Airport Hot Spots awareness
- Taxiway and runway lighting
- Proper radio phraseology
- NOTAM use
- Use Airport diagrams during taxi
- Use of GPS and localizer for runway to identify proper runway.
- Check compass/heading indicator prior to taxi and when taking the runway.

- During preflight planning use Google earth to look at airport layout.
- At towered airport, be established on final no later than 1 mile on final or expect go around.
- FAASAFETY.GOV Go to bottom of page to OFFICES and select RUNWAY SAFETY. Here you will find a wealth of information including animations for you and your students.
- Look at courses on the FAA Wings section of FAASAFETY.GOV
