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FAA Practical Test Standards AA-5-8081-88 COMMERCIAL PILOT Practical Test Standard RIVATE PILOT FLIGHT INSTRUCTOR for -I Test Sta ctical Test Standards AIRPLANE, MEL, BEB, M for GLIDER

Change is coming and coming soon. The new FAA Airmen Certification Standards that soon replaces the FAA Practical Test Standards for Private and Instrument is on the horizon. The release date is planned for June, that's right, this June! For many years the FAA-S-8081-14 publication for Private Pilot Airplane was the document that outlined the certification of Private Pilot applicants. The last revision to the document was during November of 2011.

The new Airmen Certification Standards was developed with the assistance of the aviation community and it is now available for download on www.faa.gov. Material in the new FAA-ACS-8081-PA-I is posted to be effective on 15 June. Prior editions of the Private Pilot Airplane and Instrument will be obsolete at this time for airplane applicants. To this date, controversy and questions regarding changes from the aviation community are significant.

The FAA views the Airmen Certification Standards as the foundation of a transition to a more integrated and systematic approach to airmen certification as outlined in a letter by John S. Duncan, Director of Flight Standards. Referencing the publication, the changes also focuses on safety policy, safety risk management, safety assurance processes and safety promotion in the form of an ongoing engagement with both external stakeholders in the aviation community and FAA policy divisions.

To provide guidance on the changes and updates to training, the Greater St. Louis Flight Instructor Association will be sponsoring an instructor/pilot forum that outlines and discusses details on the changes contained within the Airmen Certification Standards. The forum is currently planned for more than one location in the St. Louis area, however dates are still to be determined. We are in the process of developing the curriculum that will be used within the meetings with support from local DPE's and the FAA. Watch for FAA spans notices through the FAASTeam. If you are not receiving FAA spans messages on local aviation safety seminars and events, please register on FAA Safety.gov. We highly encourage your students to register as well. Safety programs are vital to aviation and supported by education and training by such organizations as the G.S.L.F.I.A.

This seminar will be available for instructors, pilots and students. Your attendance is encouraged.

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CFI TIPS and TECHNIQUES Teaching the "Squishy Side" of Flying Craig O'Mara, GSLFIA Director

I always found that teaching maneuvers, procedures, systems, performance, etc. much easier than things like; aeronautical decision making, physiological issues, etc. But, guess which subject area contributes to the most accidents? You go it, the Human Factors side of aircraft operation.

Aircraft are getting more reliable, avionics provide us with more information than most of

us know what to do with and weather and flight planning websites take most of the guesswork out of getting from A to B. So, what's left- you and 11 Pilots are now responsible for the vast majority of the GA accidents. Most of the accidents are due to improper decisions and poor judgment rather than poor flying skills "Loss (although of Control" has become a major cause of accidents recently and needs to be addressed with your students).



So what do we do about it as Certified Flight Instructors?

How do we teach our students to make better decisions, use better judgment? The FAA has a number of publications that I've found useful on the FAA.gov that provide guidance on decision making and teaching judgment. Some concrete teaching techniques that I use, based on those publications, are designed to make the student aware that although he or she does need to know how to take off and land, for example, they need to access their readiness to fly before they put those manual skills to use. I've found that using the suggested acronyms of: "PAVE" and "IMSAFE" (remember what those stand for?) before every lesson gets the student into a frame of mind that considers safety every time that they fly. I believe that they should be the foundation of every lesson.

Have the students access themselves (Pilot in PAVE) using the IMSAFE acronym, then the aircraft, their environment and especially

external factors that might affect their decision to fly or not. As an example, when I hear someone say that "they have to get somewhere", I always tell them to get in their car and drive, "having to get there" all too often makes pilots ignore the "red flags" that tell us that the flight may not be operating safely.

In the air line world where I do most of my flying now, we've gotten away from a check

ride that includes the standard takeoff/landing, "V1 cuts", stalls, approaches, etc. and have gone to Line Orientated Evaluations (LOE) where we just fly from here to there and various situations that cause us to determine the safety of the flight are introduced to see what decisions that we'll make and how to get the airline on the ground safely.

Maybe we can use that concept to use part of each lesson teach our students to use good judgment and make good decisions. Try it and please let me know what you think! Thanks for listening.
