



#### **KNOWN ICING**

Since it's getting to be that time of year again, I thought that it might be time to revisit the rules on "known icing". First of all, we need to determine whether or not our aircraft allows "Flight in Known Icing Conditions". This is pretty easy to determine - just look at your POH/AFM, usually Section 2 "Limitations" (found on page 2-10 in the Cessna 172R POH, for example). Next, we need to determine, what is "Flight in Known Icing" - this is a bit more problematic as 14 CFR Part 91 does NOT define the phrase (except as it applies to large aircraft in Subpart F, 91.527). We can look at the AIM (7-1-22) for advice but, as this is NOT regulatory, we probably need to look for further guidance. A letter from FAA to AOPA on 16 January 2009 seems to be the latest legal guidance on the subject. The letter, from Chief Counsel Kerry B. Long, indicates that the FAA references 91.9(a), 91.18(a) and the "catch all reg" 91.103 "Preflight Action" as guidance on enforcement on icing incidents. The FAA states that "Pilots should also carefully evaluate all of the available meteorological information relevant to a proposed flight, including applicable surface observations, temperatures aloft, terminal and area forecasts, AIRMETs, SIGMETs, and pilot reports (PIREPS).



If the composite information indicates to a reasonable and prudent pilot that he or she will be operating the aircraft under conditions that will cause ice to adhere to the aircraft along the proposed route and altitude of flight, then known icing conditions likely exist."

So, what does that all mean to us? The NTSB, in its enforcement decisions, creates the precedent regarding "Known Icing", so let's look at the recent enforcements. "Flight in known icing conditions" occurs if PIREPS (pilots report icing), and/or Forecasts indicate that icing is forecast to exist. If you fly when PIREPS and/or forecasts indicate icing and you encounter that ice and have a problem you could be subject to enforcement action under 91.9(a), 91.18(a) and/or 91.103.

We have quite a bit of meteorological information available to us to help us avoid any icing encounters. If you haven't visited the following information sources, please do so, and, because I'm always trying to learn, may I ask you to e-mail me with any other information sources, and I'll include them in further articles so that we can all learn from your years of experience. ## "Aviation Safety – Benefits & Education thru FAA-WINGS program"

Flying activities have dominated the St Louis area! Offerings for youth & education were at the top of the list. In 2022, GSLFIA hosted many seminars, including these two recent offerings ("Ask the DPE" – August 4<sup>th</sup>, "Gateway TRACON" – December 6<sup>th</sup>). Others included the "28<sup>th</sup> Annual Safety" – October 29<sup>th</sup>, "Career Exploration Fair" – November 12<sup>th</sup> in the WOH Hangar, and "Young Eagles" flights via EAA Chapter 1675 – November 19<sup>th</sup>.

The 1<sup>st</sup>-three seminars issued WINGS credits. The other two focused on youth education. Throughout 2022, were many seminars & webinars offering WINGS credits. Personally, I earned [Knowledge] Credits over 50 times - applied to my WINGS profile. These when combined with the Flight Activities, earned "Phase 3", and qualified for my Flight Review (FR). Plus, by earning a WINGS-Phase, I'll qualify for a discount for my renter's insurance. Very cool, agree?

So, let's talk about the FAA-WINGS program. The following is found in the WINGS Pilot Proficiency program's User's Guide (TC11-0007).

## <u>What is the objective of the "WINGS – Pilot Proficiency Program"?</u>

It is to reduce the number of accidents in General Aviation (GA) by assisting airmen to find educational opportunities, designed to help them apply the principles of risk assessment and risk management. When properly applied, these principles will help mitigate accident causal factors associated with common pilot errors, lack of proficiency, and faulty knowledge. The FAA's purpose is to encourage the majority of GA pilots, through WINGS, to engage in ongoing, targeted flying tasks and learning activities keyed to identified risks and which are designed to mitigate those risks

## What is the WINGS program's connection to aviation safety?

It is based on the premise that pilots who maintain currency and proficiency in the basics of flight, will enjoy a safer and more stress-free flying experience. Requirements for each aircraft category and class, include specific subjects and flight maneuvers.

The WINGS Program consists of learning activities and flight tasks, selected to address the documented causal factors of aircraft accidents.

#### Who can participate in the WINGS programs?

All pilots holding a U.S. pilot certificate may participate in the WINGS Program. To participate in flight portions of the program, pilots should contact CFI's and flight schools, and other FAASTeam members, who are or will participate in the WINGS Program. Student pilots are encouraged to participate in the WINGS Program. They will receive Phase 1 at the Basic Level, upon satisfactory completion of their Private Pilot practical test and completion of an online course on Aeronautical Decision Making (ADM).

The WINGS Program was recently redesigned, to simplify the process of attaining or demonstrating proficiency in just a few simple steps. There are three Levels available:

- Basic WINGS: This level is designed for those pilots who want to establish a recurrent training program that will provide them a higher level of proficiency than merely preparing for a normal Flight Review (FR) as required by 14 CFR 61.56.
- Advanced WINGS: This level is designed for those pilots, who want to design a program that will take them a step above the Basic Level.
- Master WINGS: This level is designed to give even more flexibility to a pilot's need for specialized training. This phase will also allow for the addition of specialized equipment and flight environment training scenarios.

#### Flight Activity, requirements for WINGS

In the new WINGS, three flight activities (based on the associated Practical Test Standards or the Airman Certification Standards), must be completed to the satisfaction of the CFI, and satisfactory completion of each activity could take 30 minutes or 3 hours. Whatever amount of time the CFI feels is necessary for the satisfactorily person to meet the requirements. All of the flight topics could be completed in one flight, but the premise of the program is for the pilot to complete them at different times, to extend their proficiency throughout the year.

#### **FAA WINGS PROGRAM CONTINUED**

So, how do you access the WINGS - Pilot Proficiency Program? That's very easy — simply access www.FAASafety.gov.

#### What is the benefit, for CFI's"?

As a CFI, you are an integral part of the aviation community, and by modeling best practices, play an important role in reducing the number of GA accidents. Because of this vital role, we strongly encourage you to earn a phase of WINGS yourself. However, there is no requirement for you to hold a current phase of WINGS to provide WINGSqualified instruction. Nonetheless, you are encouraged to participate in the WINGS - Pilot Proficiency Program for a number of reasons, not the least of which is that you will maintain your own flying skills. Another reason is that pilots will come to you to participate in the WINGS Program and when you are more at ease with the WINGS Program, pilots will have a better overall experience.

One of the benefits of participating in the WINGS Program as a CFI, is that you are eligible to renew your flight instructor certificate through participation in WINGS. If you serve as a CFI in the WINGS program, you may renew your certificate.
